## diagonal peyote stitch

excerpted from Mastering Peyote Stitch by Melinda Barta

This fun variation on peyote stitch uses end-row increases and decreases to create a strip of beadwork that's somewhat a trick of the eye-at first glance it can be hard to tell projects worked with this stitch are peyote. See example on page 45 . Learn the technique by following this sample; size $15^{\circ}$ s are used at the ends for decorative purposes, but play around with your own bead combinations. Begin with an even number of beads:
ROWS 1 AND 2 String 11 size $11^{\circ}$ s and 1 size $15^{\circ}$ (fig. 01, blue).
ROW 3 String 1 size $11^{\circ}$, skip 1 bead previously strung, and pass through the next; repeat five times to add a total of 6 size $11^{\circ} \mathrm{s}$ (fig. 01, red).
ROW 4 Work 1 stitch with 1 size
$15^{\circ}$. Work 5 stitches with 1 size $11^{\circ}$ in each stitch. To work an increase, string 1 size $11^{\circ}, 1$ size $15^{\circ}$, and 1 size $11^{\circ}$; pass back through the first size $11^{\circ}$ just added. note: The size $15^{\circ}$ just added will become a down bead and part of the previous row; the second size $11^{\circ}$ just added will become an up bead and part of the next row (fig. 02).
ROW 5 Work 5 stitches with 1 size $11^{\circ}$ in each stitch (fig. 03, blue). ROWS 6 AND ON Repeat Rows 4 and 5 for the length of the band (fig. 03, red).
