Stitch a spicy holiday ensemble with gemstones

Combine red and hessonite garnets in a double-spiral rope necklace with a coordinating centerpiece and earrings

Garnets, like many gemstones, come in a wide range of hues. In this necklace, red garnets harmonize with the yellow and amber tones of hessonite garnets for a look that's rich and elegant. A red garnet centerpiece and matching earrings pull it all together.

step by step

Necklace Spiral rope

[1] On 2 yd. (1.8m) of Fireline or conditioned thread (Basics, p. 138), leave an 8-in. (20cm) tail, and pick up a stop bead (Basics). Pick up three cylinder beads, a Charlotte bead, a red garnet, and a Charlotte. Go back through

all three cylinders in the same direction (figure 1, a-b).

[2] Pick up a Charlotte, a hessonite garnet, and a Charlotte, and go back through the cylinders (b-c).

[3] Pick up a cylinder, a Charlotte, a red garnet, and a Charlotte. Go through the last two cylinders of the previous stitch and the cylinder just picked up (photo a).







Position the new loop of beads on the right of the previous red-garnet loop.

[4] Pick up a Charlotte, a hessonite garnet, and a Charlotte, and go through the last three cylinders (**photo b**). Flip your work so the loop with the hessonite garnet is on the left. Position the new loop of beads on the right of the previous hessonite-garnet loop.

[5] Repeat steps 3 and 4 until the rope is about 8½ in. (21.6cm) long, or half the desired length minus the length of the clasp.

To end a thread, sew back into the last loop added, secure it with a few half-hitch knots (Basics) between beads, and trim. To begin a new thread, sew into a previous loop, make a few half-hitch knots between beads, and continue through the core cylinders to exit the same place you left off.

[6] To finish the first rope, pick up a cylinder, and sew back through the last cylinder added in the same direction (**figure 2**). Retrace the thread path twice. Secure the tail in a nearby loop with a few half-hitch knots between beads, and trim. Set the rope aside.

[7] Repeat steps 1–5 to make a second rope, but in steps 3 and 4, hold the new loops of beads to the left of the previous loops. This will make the beads spiral in the other direction. For the last stitch, instead of picking up a cylinder, go through the cylinder stitched to the end of the first rope in step 6.

[8] To taper the combined ropes into a point, work three more double-spiral rounds as follows:
Taper, round 1: Pick up a cylinder, a Charlotte, a garnet (choose the appropriate color based on where you ended

the design), and a Charlotte, and go back through the last two cylinders on one of the ropes and the cylinder picked up in this step (**photo c**). Do not flip the beadwork.

Pick up a Charlotte, a garnet in the same color, and a Charlotte, and go back through the last two cylinders on the other rope and the last cylinder picked up (**photo d**).

Taper, round 2: Flip the beadwork over so you're working on the other side of the ropes. Pick up a cylinder, a Charlotte, a garnet in the other color, and a Charlotte, and go back through the last cylinder on one of the ropes, the cylinder added in the previous round, and the cylinder picked up in this step (**photo e**). Do not flip the beadwork.

Taper, round 3: Work one normal round of double spiral (one stitch per side), choosing the appropriate garnet colors to match the design (**photo g**).

Centerpiece

[1] Pick up the 7mm bead. If the bead's hole is large enough, pick up enough cylinders to equal the length of the 7mm, and string the 7mm over them (**photo h**).

[2] Pick up 13 cylinders, a Charlotte, a teardrop-shaped garnet, a Charlotte, and two cylinders. Skip the last seven beads, and go back up through the next cylinder (**figure 3, a–b**).

[3] Pick up three cylinders, a Charlotte, a teardrop, a Charlotte, and two cylinders.

Go through the cylinder your thread is exiting from bottom to top (**b–c**). Repeat four times to make a total of five loops, going through the same cylinder with each repetition. **[4]** Go through two cylinders (photo **i**), and repeat step 3. **[5]** Repeat step 4 twice. **[6]** Go through two cylinders, and make five more loops, each consisting of two cylinders, a Charlotte, a teardrop, a Charlotte, and a cylinder. **[7]** Go through two cylinders, and make five more loops, each consisting of a cylinder, a Charlotte, a teardrop, and a Charlotte. **[8]** Go through the 7mm, secure the thread in the spiral rope with a few half-hitch knots, and trim.

Clasp

[1] Remove the stop bead from one end of the necklace. Thread a needle on the tail, pick up seven cylinders, and go through the loop on one clasp half. Sew back into the spiral rope (photo **j**), and tie a half-hitch knot. Retrace the thread path two or three times, secure the thread, and trim.

[2] Repeat on the other end.

Earrings

[1] On 1 yd. (.9m) of Fireline or conditioned thread, leave a 6-in. (15cm) tail, and pick up seven cylinder beads. Tie the ends with a square knot (Basics), and go through a few cylinders.

[2] Pick up a 4mm bead, ten cylinders, a Charlotte bead, a teardrop-shaped garnet, a Charlotte, and a cylinder. Skip the last five beads, and go through the next cylinder in the opposite direction (photo **k**).

[3] Work four rounds of five loops per round as in the centerpiece, but use two

EDITOR'S NOTE:
Hessonite garnets are available in graduated colors from pale yellow to dark amber. Placing the darker beads near the clasp and the lighter beads near the front gives the illusion that the spiral rope gets thicker as it nears the centerpiece.

MATERIALS

both projects

- Nymo conditioned with beeswax or Thread Heaven, or Fireline 6 lb. test
- beading needles, #13

necklace 18 in. (46cm)

- 7mm gold-filled round bead
- 16-in. (41cm) strand 3 x 2mm–6 x 4mm faceted teardrop-shaped garnets
- 2 16-in. strands 2.5–3mm garnets (round or rondelle)
- 2 16-in. strands 2.5–3mm hessonite garnets (round or rondelle)
- 3g size 11° Japanese cylinder beads
- hank size 13° gold-plated Charlotte beads
- clasp

earrings

- 2 4mm gold-filled round beads
- 40 teardrop-shaped garnets left over from necklace
- 2g size 11° Japanese cylinder beads
- size 13° Charlotte beads left over from necklace
- pair of earring findings
- chainnose pliers
